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Synopsis

A bourgeois middle-aged dentist named Veronica (MARIA ONETTO) drives alone on a dirt road, becomes distracted, and runs over something. Immediately she becomes disoriented, unmoored from her identity and reality, like a sleepwalker who's actually awake. As the week go on, she becomes obsessed with the possibility that she may have killed someone: a young boy whose body is found in a roadside canal. Veronica tries to piece together what happened while her husband systematically erases her tracks. A chilling parable about a woman in shock, Lucrecia Martel's third feature explores the intricacies of class and the role of women in a male-dominated society.

Director's Notes

The best thing about traveling by land is to refrain from sleeping and to listen:

-I very seldom have nightmares but when I have them, the main theme in general is that I killed someone. In my nightmares I am an assassin, and I wake up crying because I no longer believe in God, who could be the only one capable of comforting me with his mercy. The only one I respect. Then I dry my tears and feel that I am a good person, that it has all been a bad dream and that I would never kill anyone.

One night I dreamt that I killed a man with a stick. I got rid of the body but could not get rid of the head. I was in a hurry to go to work, so I put the man's head on a kitchen shelf. I would take care of it when I came back from work. When I got back in the evening, there was a not from my father on the table. It was that time when my father would come to the city on business and would fly back home in the evening. The note said: "I arranged your kitchen shelf. Love, Daddy."

Sure enough, the kitchen shelf now had a false bottom and behind it was the well-concealed head of the dead man. I woke up crying – what a great family I have! What unconditional love! I had the urge to call all my siblings, my parents; I could not wait to see them. You should meet them.

Last night I dreamt again. I was coming out of my Grandma's house after a visit and, when looking for my car keys in my purse, I found a black hand. Dark skin. I realized I killed a black woman. The keys in my purse are not my car keys but the keys to an apartment where I am going and where I know the body is. I woke up crying a screaming.

- Who did the hand belong to?
- I guess the maid's. Poor thing.
- And you never cry for the people you killed?
- Well, I hardly know them.

This movie was created in the vapor of this conversation.

Director's Biography

Born in 1966, Martel studied animation at Avellaneda Experimental (AVEX), attended the National Experimentation Filmmaking School (ENERC) for several years, and studied Communication Science. She directed a number of short films between 1988 and 1994, including *Rey Muerto* (*Dead King*), when was part of *Historías Breves I* (*Brief Tales I*). In 2001, Martel directed the film *La Ciénaga* (*The Swamp*), which won awards in Berlin, Havana, Toulouse, and Sundance, among other festivals. In 2004, Martel wrote and directed *La Niña Santa* (*The Holy Girl*), which competed for the Cannes Film Festival *Palm d'Or* that year. She was a member of the Cannes Film Festival Jury in 2006.
